A foley artist uses his body to create sounds for a looping horse in "Passage" - a dressage term for a slowed down trot. Through his meticulous sound reenactments, a human-animal passage comes to light. He breaks into a dance with a new body adorned with a luscious horsetail, and even begins to embody the horse's sounds. The portrait of the morphing foley artist was inspired by Man Ray's sculptural approach to the female body, challenged by a gender non-binary performer Simon(e) Jaikiriuma Paetau.

A foley artist's job is to enhance the illusion of reality in a film using sound. Up until the 90's Foley Artists were not even regularly credited in films. "Passage" was made with love to all the backstage magicians who make cinema what it is.

The Body is a House of Familiar Rooms

A magical-realist documentary in collaboration between Eloise Sherrid, Samuel Geiger, and his partner, the painter Lauryn Welch. The film is a window into Sam's experience living with Ehlers-Danlos
Syndrome, a painful connective tissue disorder that complicates mobility in both physical and social spheres. It's also a portrait of his life with Lauryn. As Sam's physical world becomes more confined, the spaces in which he resides and nurtures compound with imagery and detail, becoming endlessly rich worlds within rooms. In the film, we express this through the visual mixing of paintings and live action

video footage, revealing the emotional dimension of each space. This film is about disability, love, and the forms both take within the bodies and spaces we are given.

'Liebesträume' was filmed in Kazuo Ohno Dance Studio, the legendary and historical studio full of conflict between father and son through dance. The space is full of posters, props, costumes, and a photo of Kazuo with Pina Bausch. 'Liebesträume' is based on the footage of Yoshito Ohno in the stage performance 'On Kazuo Ohno' by Takao Kawaguchi, edited as an alternative short film version.
